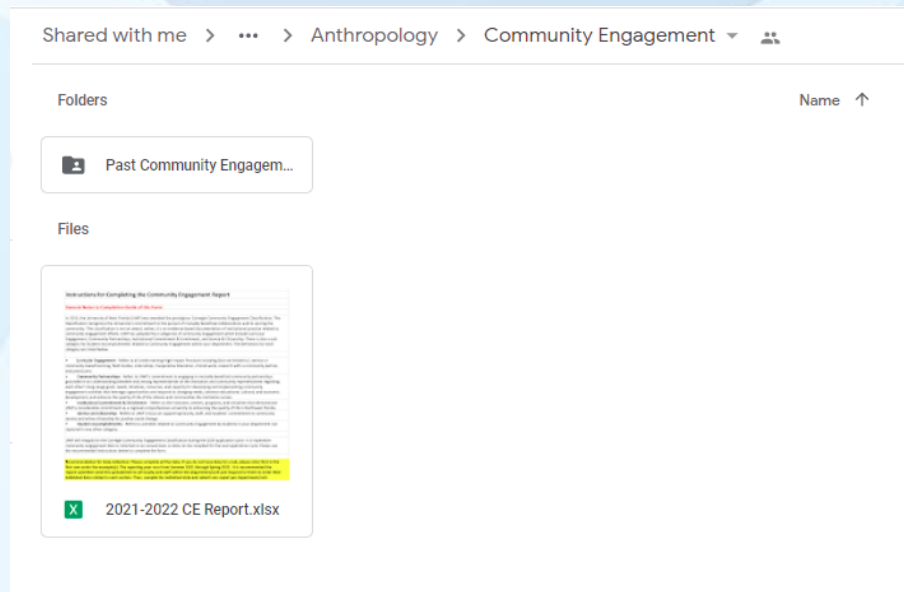
Why do we report?

Reporting Format

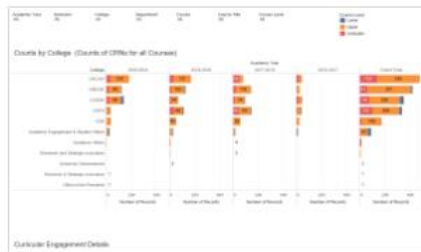

Community Engagement Dashboard

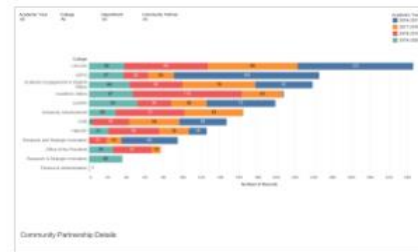
The Dashboard allows users to:

- Complete grant and award applications with a community engagement focus

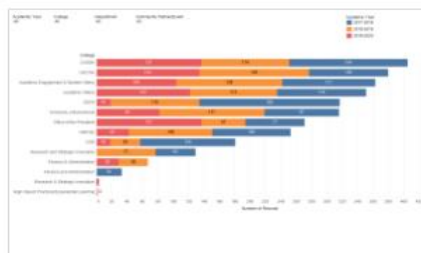

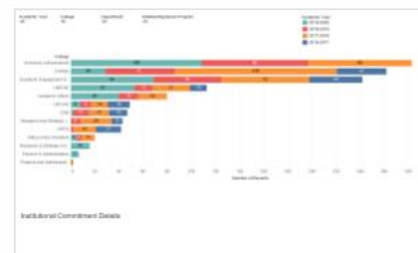

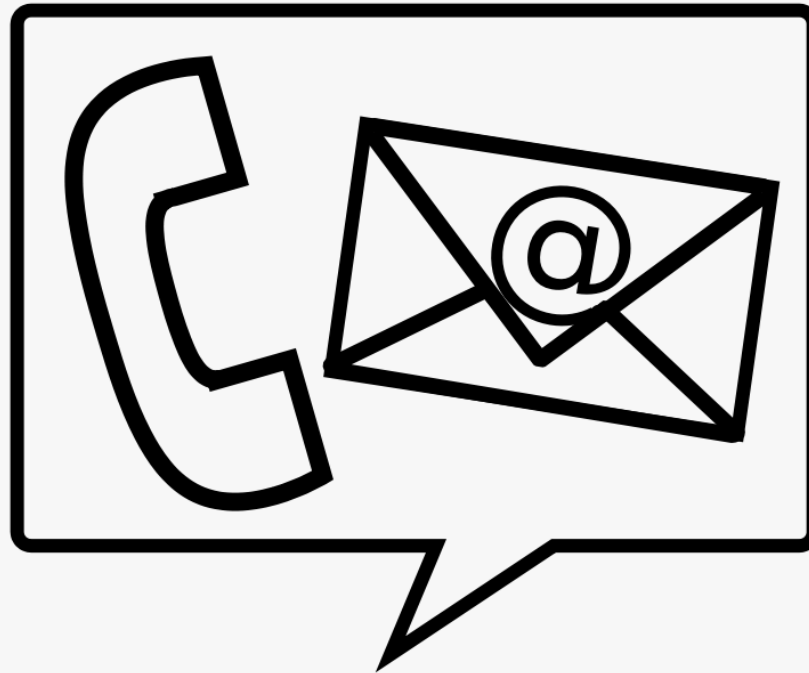
