NSF-funded program to encourage statewide collaboration

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The University of West Florida is partnering with other Florida institutions on a program to encourage cooperation among faculty researchers throughout the state.

The program, “Leveraging a Research Development Professional Network to Catalyze Statewide Innovative and Societally Relevant Research,” will connect interested faculty researchers at 22 state institutions so they can work in teams on issues that are important to Florida residents. The program is funded through the National Science Foundation Directorate for Engineering [Germination program](#).

“I am honored to have the opportunity to work with this phenomenal group of research development professionals to recruit and support faculty teams throughout the state of Florida,” said [Leigh Stephens](#), senior grants specialist with the Office of Research Administration and Engagement. Stephens is the University’s representative on the NSF-funded program.

The program focuses on addressing [coastal challenges](#) the state faces. These include sea level rise, loss of biodiversity and threats to coastal and community resilience. Faculty members interested in participating may pitch their own research ideas related to the coastal theme, as well.

Participants will attend a “Research Summit” Aug. 17-19 at which they will work with colleagues throughout the state to develop and refine their ideas. That will be followed by a seven-month “Idea Sprint” during which participants will collaborate with team members on their chosen project. Travel, lodging, and food expenses for the Research Summit will be covered by the program.

The program will result in the creation by each team of a white paper or other research product.

Taking part in the program will provide researchers with the chance to broaden their partner network, to gain a fuller understanding of issues facing the state, to work in a collaborative environment with colleagues throughout the state, and to receive assistance to develop and submit a grant proposal and/or scholarly product related to their project.

The program is competitive. UWF faculty members interested in participating should contact Stephens (soon) for more information and for help developing a proposal. The deadline to apply [online](#) is June 10.

“Diversity and inclusion are important factors in recruiting and building teams,” Stephens said. “We are all excited to get this project underway and look forward to unlocking the great possibilities for Florida researchers.”
