<b>Association Author</b>	The Public Agenda Foundation found that costs increased (15).  Costs have increased (Public Agenda Foundation 15). In 1992, the Public Agenda Foundation found that costs were increased.  <b>NOTES: If the association's name is easily recognized by an acronym, you may use the acronym. For example, let's say you have a work published in 2000 by People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals which is known mostly as PETA.
