Mission Statement

The Master of Science in Nursing: Entry into Practice "direct entry" (DEMSN) is a full-time five-semester nursing program for non-nursing college graduates who wish to become registered nurses (RNs). The DEMSN program prepares students in the provision of evidence-based nursing care with an emphasis on care coordination to a diverse patient population along the wellness/illness continuum across all care settings. The curriculum provides basic nursing knowledge and practice expertise enhanced with master's coursework in areas such as advanced assessment, advanced pharmacology, advanced pathophysiology, and population health and promotion. Students complete over 600 clinical hours in clinical areas such as labor and delivery, medical surgical, pediatrics, population/public health, and mental health. The program prepares students to enter the nursing profession as master's credentialed registered nurses better prepared to meet the demands of an evolving healthcare system. At the end of the program, graduates receive a Master of Science degree in Nursing and sit for the nationwide test for licensing registered nurses - the National Council Licensure Examination - RN (NCLEX-RN).

- Engage and apply communication strategies to collaborate as a member / leader of interprofessional teams to advocate for healthcare policies and to influence health promotion, education, and high quality patient outcomes.

Integrity/Values

 Provide care and mentoring in a compassionate manner that fosters respect, protects and enhances spiritual integrity, and advocates for human dignity of diverse persons and populations.
