TeacherReady supports candidates to meet these assurances as demonstrated performance in knowledge of discipline, discipline-specific practices, professional responsibilities, and student learners and learning through: (a) diverse field placement and (b) program curriculum; and (c) field placement and program curriculum assignments are aligned to the Florida Educator Accomplished Practices, Professional Education Competencies, and InTasc standards. The culminating experience (lesson 8) serves as one example that highlights how field experiences and assignments throughout the TeacherReady curriculum model continuous improvement in learning using research and evidence to measure students' progress to meet these assurances. For example, the candidate begins by assessing the knowledge of his/her students to first plan the lessons for the week, creating scaffolded instruction with learning targets, learning tasks (do) and assessments (study). At the end of each day, the candidate reflects on the day and

discusses with his/her mentor teacher, and plans again (act) for the next day based on the assessment feedback. Using this same process of Plan. Do. Study. Act. (action research), TeacherReady lesson and field experience assignments up to and including culminating engage candidates to use research and evidence to measure students' progress and adjust instruction to meet student needs. In both lesson and field experience assignments, candidates use the Student Engagement Framework along with the external expectations for learning, such as State Standards and Next Generation Science Standards to create scope and sequence for getting all students across all schools from a starting point to an expected ending point.

UWF's TeacherReady will increase the teacher pipeline into the mathematics area by increasing completers by 5% over the previous year of 36. Completion in Middle Grades and /or Math 6-12 subject areas will total 38 students in the 2022-23 school year. This will be accomplished through reach out to those in Florida on temporary teaching certificates and partner school districts offering to assist with certification needs, paying specific attention to the critical needs areas. Staff will also provide materials and when invited attend the separation/ retirement seminars at the Naval Air Station Pensacola to share about teaching with departing military members.

4. Description of strategies used to achieve goal, if applicable:

TeacherReady partnered with school districts and Regional Offices of Education in seeking community members who would be good teachers to come into the field. These district partners consisted of TeacherReady doing informational sessions and providing ongoing additional support for the district and the candidates. Many of these districts funded these candidates and paid for their program if the candidate would sign a 3-year commitment to teach in their district upon completion.

TeacherReady increased district level availability and assistance in identifying potential high-quality teachers by providing community informational sessions. Testing continues to be an issue even during admissions, so TeacherReady added in additional instructor support.

Our overall enrollment dropped significantly which heavily impacted these goals.
